The social costs of depressive disorders in Poland related to the lost productivity are estimated at PLN 1.2–2.6 billion annually. Despite the wide public debate on psychiatric care and the introduction of the National Mental Health Program, access to comprehensive and accessible psychiatric care in Poland has not improved significantly.

How Has the Influx of War Refugees Changed Cities?

As a result of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, nearly 3 million people crossed the Ukrainian–Polish border, and Poland became the second largest refugee receiving country in the world after Turkey. NIS2 - How Are We Prepared?

Legislative work on the NIS2 directive at the EU level is coming to an end, and its text will probably be published at the end of this year with a deadline of 21 months for implementation, NIS2 essentially expands the catalog of entities falling under its scope, at the same time departing from the individual designation of entities. As a rule, any entity of the type and sector listed in the Annex to the Directive will automatically be subject to the obligations under NIS2. A risk-based approach is maintained with the addition of additional elements necessary for cybersecurity, such as supply chain security analysis and the use of cryptography. NIS2 also introduces regulations on penalties modeled on the GDPR. Efficient implementation of NIS2 regulations is crucial for further strengthening the cyber resilience of the EU, including Poland. It will be a considerable challenge for both obliged entities and competent authorities responsible for supervision. Therefore, if EU Member States want to continue to rely on this energy source and use its potential to generate low–carbon energy, including for example hydrogen production, it is necessary to invest more and more resources in innovative technologies not only for RES, but also still in key scientific research and innovations, e.g. in the field of the highest safety standards of nuclear power. For example, the Euratom research and training program planned for 2021–2025 and ultimately until 2027, covers financing programmes in this field. Is there a chance for a unified nuclear strategy at European level?
